

PANEL DISCUSSION
HOW EFFECTIVELY DO SIMULATION CONFERENCES AND PUBLICATIONS
SERVE THEIR INTENDED AUDIENCE?

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A few of the multitude of possible discussion topics which may be of interest to this panel and its attendees include:

1. How suitable is the breadth of topics provided in simulation books, conferences and conference proceedings?
2. How suitable is the depth of topics?
3. Is the coverage of interest both to academics and to simulation practitioners?
4. Is there too much or too little selectivity by editors and referees?
5. Are simulation textbooks adequate, or is it necessary to supplement them extensively?
6. Are certain simulation professional groups providing more and/or better services to their members than others are?
7. Are conferences and publications inbred? That is, do you tend to hear from the same people year after year? If yes, is this a good thing or a bad thing?
8. Should the Winter Simulation Conference be limited to topics in discrete event simulation or combined discrete/continuous simulation, and the Summer Computer Simulation Conference be limited to topics in continuous simulation?
9. Should there be more special-purpose conferences and/or publications in areas like simulation language development or modeling of computer systems?
10. Should there be one- or two-day hands-on tutorials offered in conjunction with the Winter Simulation Conference? If so, should they be offered by private parties on a for-profit basis?
11. Is there a satisfactory degree of co-operation and interaction among the various professional societies and publications? Do the same articles appear in more than one place, with minor or no revision?
